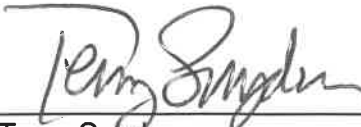

Dear Itasca County Board Members,

The Greenway School Board has consistently worked to maintain and upgrade its historic buildings throughout the last century. Recently they have accepted a bid to complete the last sections of new roofing needed at the high school. The board has also newly redone the HVAC systems to provide a safer internal environment to meet the needs of current medical and health concerns. Still ahead are door and window replacements in the high school.

The constantly evolving public safety environment requires a safe and controlled access to school buildings that weren't envisioned a century ago. While the Greenway high school building is just over 100 years old and does not need to be replaced, it does need a safe and secure entrance for today's needs. This issue exists in VanDyke elementary as well and must be addressed.

We ask that the Board consider using \$1 million of the American Recovery Plan funds to help support these remaining building projects to keep the community's investment in its buildings operating well into the future. Taxpayers have always been very supportive of the Greenway School District. Greenway currently has debt in the amount of approximately \$26 million and has invested \$22 million in two facility improvement projects within the last 11 years.

When the ISD 316 School Board became aware of the availability of the funds due to the recent board decision regarding Nashwauk Keewatin School District's funding request for a new building, we thought we should also approach the County to consider assistance in funding the much-needed projects in Greenway.

We appreciate your consideration and look forward to hearing from you.

Support Public Health Response

- Services to contain and mitigate the spread of COVID-19, including vaccination, medical expenses, testing, contact tracing, quarantine costs, capacity enhancements, and many related activities
- Behavioral healthcare services, including mental health or substance misuse treatment, crisis intervention, and related services
- Payroll and covered benefits for public health, healthcare, human services, and public safety staff to the extent that they work on the COVID-19 response

Replace Public Sector Revenue Loss

- Ensure continuity of vital government services by filling budget shortfalls
- Revenue loss is calculated relative to the expected trend, beginning with the last full fiscal year pre-pandemic and adjusted annually for growth
- Recipients may re-calculate revenue loss at multiple points during the program, supporting those entities that experience revenue loss with a lag

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ElderCircle – Response, Recovery and Rebuilding - Senior and Community Centers Throughout Itasca County - Post Pandemic

Older adults continue to be a population largely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Since the COVID pandemic started, many of the senior and community centers have closed their doors and have not reopened to senior programming. These Centers are extremely important to older adults who live in these rural communities. Older adults look to these Centers to provide access to community resources, outreach to isolated or vulnerable population, encourage physical activity, open up new sources of support, possible essential nutrition services that may be provided out of that center, possible volunteer opportunities and elevate the entire community. These senior and community centers are vital hubs providing a place for the community to connect and socialize. Benefits and impact research show that older adults who partake in senior center programs can learn to manage and delay the onset of chronic disease and experience measurable improvements in their physical, social, spiritual, emotional, mental and economic wellbeing. They also found that senior centers designated as community focal points that not only provide helpful resources to older adults, but serve the entire community with information on aging, support for family caregivers, and training for professionals and students.

ElderCircle currently facilitates programming at the Active Living Center that is located on the Itasca YMCA campus in Grand Rapids. This facility is a multi-generational space that allows for people of all ages to gather. Some of the programming that is currently offered as ongoing options; Support Groups, Health and Wellness Classes; Coffee Groups; Knitting Groups; Book Clubs; Bingo; Board Games. We also are offering additional community education; Fraud Prevention; Medicare Information Sessions; Health Fairs; Board Games. We have also partnered with local artist, to be able to offer a variety of art classes for a minimal fee, these have included watercolor painting, wool felting, and pottery classes. Our goal is to boost older adult's health, encourage mental engagement, provide connection to resources, and foster a sense of community.

ElderCircle facilitates a monthly meeting of Committee on Aging (COA). This group meets monthly and is made up of representatives from each senior center in Itasca County. These representatives come together to find ways to help support their senior centers. The COA group did not meet from the start of COVID until the fall of 2021. During these meetings, these representatives reported about their centers being closed, loss of members interest due to health concerns

Many of the senior centers throughout Itasca County have come to a complete halt or closed since COVID. We believe that they are in need of support to help with the recovery and rebuilding of their centers. We propose that ElderCircle will help each center throughout Itasca County by supporting each center individually with help in offering programming, supports and community resources. We will also help them with arranging and marketing their centers to gain attendance from new older adults in the communities so they can find a place to gather and socialize right in their own community.

The pandemic made us realize we can not go back to the way everything was. That having the opportunity and options for remote opportunities is also important for many reasons. Providing technology in many of the community centers would allow for additional opportunities that are being offered. We would like to help each center in Itasca County with expanding their technology options.

This could be a community computer, smart TV, iPads, or other forms of technology that would best for that community's needs. Example could be that older adults can attend a book club monthly by attending a virtual book club that is being hosted some where else, while they access the meeting via a smart TV. We are already seeing this being a successful option in the Calumet Center. There is a group of older adults that are attending fitness classes offered by ElderCircle via their smart TV. This allows the older adult to just drive a few miles to the center and not all the way to Grand Rapids. It also allows them to meet with a smaller group during COVID while attending a class virtually.

In order to help recover and rebuild these centers, we propose that we work individually with each center to help determine their needs and provide help with adding technology, programming and community resource library in each center. Currently there are 16 centers in Itasca County. In order to support we are looking to find champion older adult in each location willing to take on a leadership role in their community. We will support and assist each center with developing ongoing programming and access to resources. Each center's current technology would be analyzed. We would like to see a smart TV and an iPad or laptop computer at each center. The smart TV would allow for streaming and access to other virtual opportunities. The iPad or laptop would be used to search for support and service resources by using the [All About Aging \(findhelp.com\)](https://findhelp.com) platform as the home page. This is specific to resources available in the Itasca and Northern St. Louis County area. We know some centers may need help to get back on their feet with WIFI also since COVID they have let items like this go. We would help each of the 16 centers plan for a Grand Opening between spring and fall of 2022 to reintroduce each center to the community and gain additional traffic. This would include vendors, possible health screening, activities, wellness class demonstrations, and ElderCircle's Home Visitor to help with guidance to other resources. ElderCircle will also provide the marketing of flyers, social media and local newspapers.

ElderCircle will also be applying for a Live Well at Home (LWAH) Grant in the spring of 2022 to continue and sustain this project for a couple of years. The dollars from this grant can be used as match dollars for the DHS LWAH to further the recovery of the community centers.

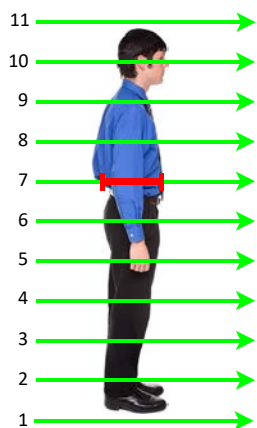

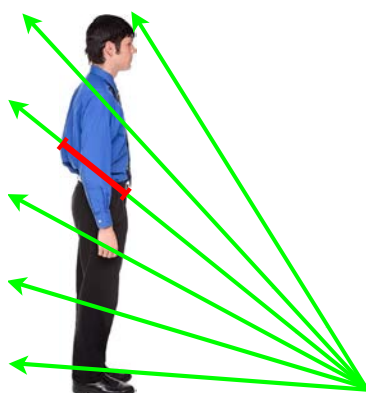

As shown below, Intercept's scanning beam passes through the person directly from back to front. This is the shortest distance possible through the body, about 11 inches in thickness. In contrast, other products scan at an *angle*, requiring the beam to pass through about 16 inches of tissue. This five inches of extra thickness has a devastating effect on image quality and dose, making a 140 lbs person look like 300 lbs!

Just as important, this means that Intercept's images have no distortion; the belly button appears directly in front of the small of the back, as it should. With angled x-ray scanning, the belly button appears at the same location as the shoulder blades, making image analysis extremely difficult.

Preliminary engineered design and estimated costs have been produced for the fairgrounds park campground project. The design has maximized sites in the west and north half of the campground as per the Minnesota Department of Health regulations. The goal is to provide electric, water, and sanitary hookup to as many sites as possible. The attached preliminary engineer design shows 41 designated sites and roads to be developed in the north and west half of the campground where most RV units have been camping. This new plan has electric, water, and sanitary in 37 sites and only electric and water in the 4 most westerly sites. It is estimated at \$20,050.00 to add sanitary pump system for sewer to these 4 sites and any westerly future sites, these costs are not included in the project estimate.

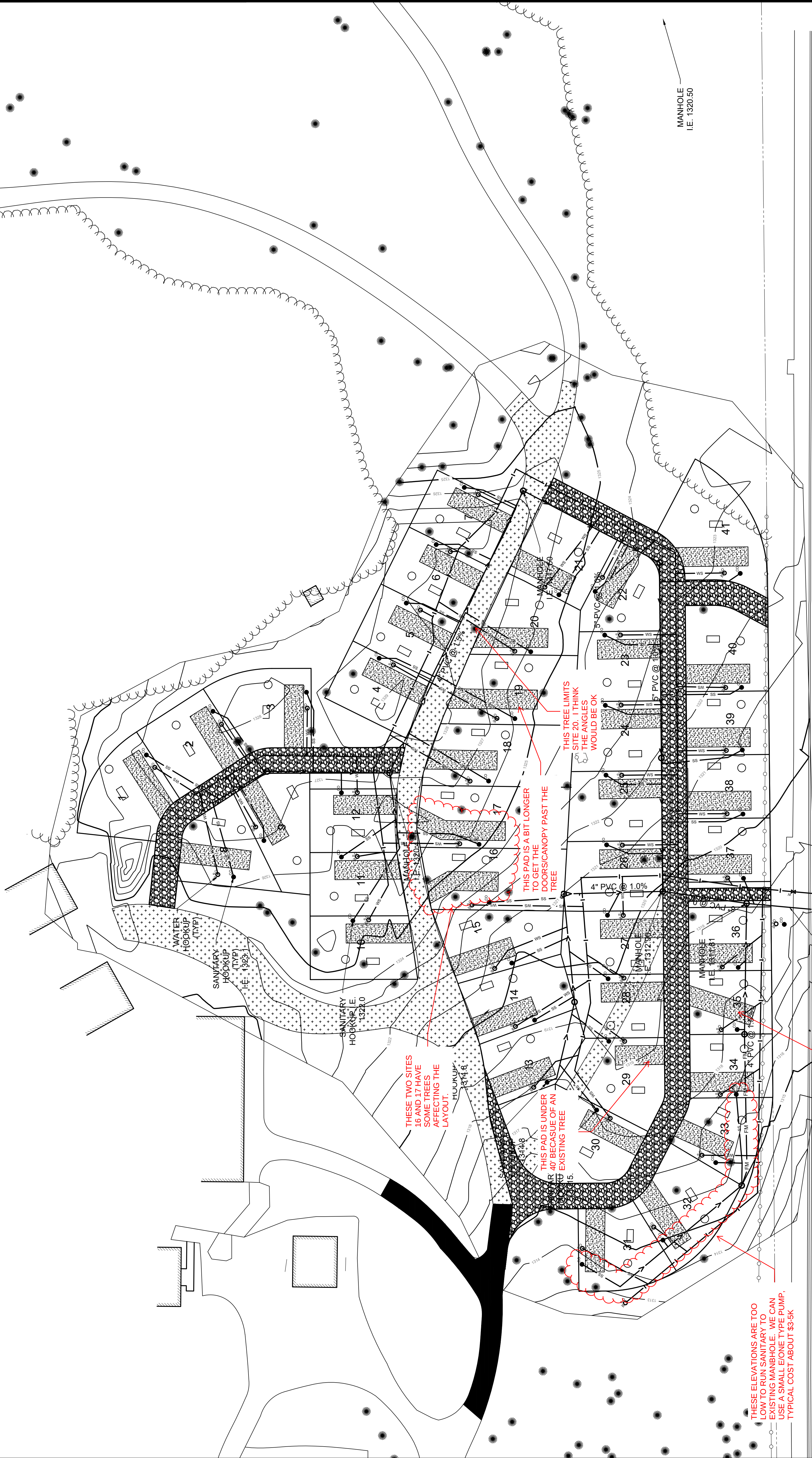

Dear Blackduck Ambulance Service Area Townships,

Blackduck Ambulance Association, Inc. (BAAI) is a non-profit ambulance service that covers a primary service area of approximately 1300 square miles and serves a population of 18,000, including parts of Beltrami, Itasca, and Koochiching counties. BAAI is a part-time Advanced Life Support (ALS) service staffed by Paramedics and Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) providing emergency care and transportation 24 hours a day, seven days a week, throughout the year.

BAAI is administered by a board of directors with members representing stakeholders from across the service area. The board directs the on-going development of the service, including appropriation of funds provided through an Emergency Medical Services (EMS) taxing district established in 2000.

The taxing district funding is the primary source of income for the service. Though it is a consistent and reliable source, it also fixed at level set by the State legislature and adjusted infrequently. Therefore, it is slow to respond to increases in operating expenses. That being the case, BAAI has found it challenging to keep pace with increased costs for supplies and equipment, offer competitive wages, on going training requirements for staff, upgrading equipment, and maintaining facilities. This all ultimately impacts our ability to continue to provide our communities with the high level of service they deserve.

As an example, two priority items affected by funding challenges include:

- Purchase and installation of power LOAD Cot System. The Power LOAD system lifts and lowers the patient cot into and out of the ambulance. This would help alleviate the heavy lifting required by our ambulance team and significantly reduce the stress and cumulative trauma on our staff's bodies. The system also improves staff and the patient's safety by supporting the cot throughout the loading and unloading process. The cost of the Power LOAD Cot System is approximately \$35,000.
- Training opportunities for our staff to further develop their knowledge and skills. Annual staff training expenses average \$15,000. This does not include training staff members pay for themselves.

Your township can help us by considering additional funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) to help offset some of our organization's increasing operating costs. BAAI is a 501(c)3 corporation. All donations are tax deductible. Our tax identification number can be provided upon request.
